It was a staggering achievement really, when you consider that we only won eleven games all season; He scored four each against Everton and Bury. By way of contrast, in Boro's first division relegation year of 1981-82, we played the same amount of games as in 1927-28, but won only eight. The top scorers that season were Heine Otto, Billy Ashcroft and Bobby Thomson with.....Well, er, five each actually.

It is truly sad that great footballers such as Camsell were born too early - how much would he be worth in today's world football market? It's likely that if George had been told back in the Twenties that players such as he would be millionaires in the 1990's he would have laughed

into his pint. Mind you, if you would have told me ten years ago that Boro' would be First Division Champions in 1995, (ten years ago was pre-premier league, remember) I'd have thought you meant the Conference. Oh, and by the way I would have agreed with you.
